Recognising that a better present and a preserved future cannot be achieved by a system created in the last century, considering the current diplomatic environment and the disparities in the objectives of different countries, the United Nations will have member states adopt the Pact for the Future during the Summit of the Future in New York on 22-23 September 2024. The document will consolidate the necessary actions to overcome the obstacles to achieving the Sustainable Development Goals. It will include a chapter on Future Generations, focusing on actions conducive to a more sustainable and inclusive future by integrating young people into decision-making processes.

Alefa Diaspora and its partners, the Organisation of African, Caribbean, and Pacific States (OACPS) and the Africa-Europe Foundation (AEF), are organising a side event to the UN Summit Action Days dedicated to elevating the youth voice. Mid-way through a global 'super-year' of elections and in the context of new institutional and programming cycles for the EU and AU, the United Nations is set to host the Summit of the Future in New York in September 2024. Co-led by Namibia and Germany, the Summit is outlined as "a moment to mend eroded trust and demonstrate that international cooperation can effectively tackle current challenges..." At the heart of these challenges lies the climate-health nexus, elevated at COP28 and most recently at the 77th World Health Assembly in Geneva, where member states adopted a resolution acknowledging insufficient financing as a significant barrier to developing resilient and sustainable health systems.

With countries expected to enhance their next round of Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) and National Adaptation Plans (NAPs) in 2025, covering the period from 2025-2035, it's crucial that a ONE health approach is adopted and for countries to secure the technical capacities and financial resources to deliver on commitments. Accessibility, quality, and predictability of climate finance, as well as honouring climate finance commitments, together with innovative finance, will play a critical role in operationalising revised NDCs. It will also contribute to future-proofing, climate-proofing and integrating the development and health agendas.

To this end, and in the lead-up to COP29, going through all the way to Financing for Development Conference in Spain, to the World Social Summit in Qatar till COP30 in Belem, Brazil, the climatehealth community calls for an effective, needs-based, accountable, and predictable New Collective Quantified Goal (NCQG) on Climate Finance, whereby health is fully integrated and recognised as a transversal theme that cuts across climate action and sustainable development at large. As we forge ahead amongst several competing global priorities in need of financing, climate-resilient health systems must be considered a mandatory and foundational element to build upon for a prosperous society.

In this context, we are convening a High-level roundtable on Climate and Health to reflect on financing gaps and opportunities, as well as innovative instruments to better track climate finance and bridge the disconnect between money pledged and accounted for, and finance received on the ground.

Objectives:

- Lay the groundwork for COP29 and look ahead to COP30, with the aim of uniting a global health voice to place "health" at the core of negotiations including the global goal on adaptation, new climate finance targets and the loss and damage fund.
- Support the bridging and operationalization of agendas such as the Guiding Principles for Financing Climate and Health Solutions and the Joint Roadmap for Climate-Health Finance by International Financing Institutions.
- Engage high-level political leaders to commit to the necessary financing quantum, instruments, and timeframe for delivering climate finance within the New Collective Quantified Goal (NCQG), which supports all required climate actions, including those in the health sector.
- Elevate innovative financing models that are just, equitable and non-debt burdening, while strengthening the accountability of allocations to ensure effectiveness of investments, reaching communities.

To achieve the set objectives and foster bold political commitments in the lead-up to COP29, the convening will focus on engaging key policymakers, experts, and diverse health and climate funders. They will strive to lay a foundation for a joint Africa-Europe Climate-Health Roadmap, emphasizing the need for grant-based and blended climate and health financing models that are

just, equitable and don't add to existing debt burdens, especially for Africa where the impacts of climate on health are largely felt.

Annex 2: From Risk to Resilience: Unlocking Climate Financing for Local Health Adaptation

The impacts of climate change on global health are intensifying, with over 3.5 billion people living in highly vulnerable areas. By 2050, climate change could cause up to 14.5 million additional deaths and \$12.5 trillion in economic losses globally. As the world approaches the critical 1.5°C threshold, urgent adaptation strategies are needed.

Despite commitments exceeding US \$1 billion for climate and health at COP28 and a resolution on climate change and health by WHO member states, a substantial funding gap persists. Vulnerable countries require hundreds of billions annually for adaptation, but current funding levels are insufficient, with minimal access to funds for local stakeholders and only a fraction of global climate finance reaching communities directly.

The Collective MindS Climate x Health Council, the think tank of Foundation S, has developed an actionable framework to promote flexible and accessible financing for locally led adaptations that protect health. To mark the publication of this action report, *Foreign Policy*, Foundation S, and the Africa-Europe Foundation will host a high-level event at UNGA, bringing together academics, policymakers, and advocates. This event will spotlight how those working at the intersection of climate and health can unlock the potential of locally led adaptations, propose solutions to increase

health care systems resilience, and address barriers to climate and health financing to ensure that funding reaches those most in need.
